FOLLOWING IN THE WANDERING SPIRIT OF GOD

Doing God's will across the Atlantic

"Every day I wake up and ask God what the next step in my journey will be."



Those are the words of Sr. Marie Pauline Guillemette, as she prepares to go to Northampton, England, to help start an international Daughters of the Holy Spirit novitiate. Along with one DHS sister

from Nigeria and one from Cameroon, Sr. Marie Pauline says she wants to form an international community that would welcome new novices into religious life.

"My hope is that we live in an international community, united together in a house of charity," she said. "My hope is for a place of prayer, community and service."

It all started back in 1962, shortly after the Leominster, Massachusetts native entered DHS religious life in Putnam, at just 18-years old.

"One of my superiors said 'We'll send you to Africa, with cannibals, diseases, heat and all kinds of deprivations,'" Sr. Marie Pauline said. "I didn't want to go."

It took four years, but her first mission was as a first-grade teacher in Moosup, Connecticut, a bit short of the Dark Continent. It was the start of decades as a primary school teacher at schools in Moosup, Fairfield, Waterbury, Hartford and northern California. That led to nine years in rural Alabama, running after-school programs for African-American

children. She was one of only two white people.

"They were very poor and isolated," Sr. Marie Pauline said. "One day we took the children to the beach, because they had never seen the ocean. This was 1988 to 1997 when I was there. We arrived and some of the white people there said that the beach was only for white people. We stayed anyway. So there was racism sometimes like you would have expected from earlier times. I called it 'Little Africa,' because they were all African-Americans and they lived in small villages, grouped together based on who they were related to, like in Africa. It prepared me for what came next."

What came next was a fifteen-year stint as a teacher and librarian on a mission in the

western African nation of Burkina Faso. Along the way, she learned four native languages.

"The people there were poor, but very welcoming," she said. "I taught CCD; I sang in the French choir; I started the school library. Before then the children didn't have enough books to study with."

It wasn't all fun. She caught all the major local diseases. Ironically, however, she was back home on vacation in Putnam in 2005 when she got malaria. By the time the local doctors figured it out, she had nearly died. However, she bounced back and stayed in Burkina Faso for another seven years, finally returning to Putnam in 2012. That same year, she had another scare, when a tumor was discovered near the carotid artery in her throat. It was removed and she recovered.

Turning 79 in February, Sr. Marie Pauline started planning for her new assignment in England last April. At an age when most people would be content to look back on a life well lived, she is set straight toward the future.



"This is the next step on my journey with God," she said.

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THE DHS FAMILY HONORS FOUNDER

On an absolutely gorgeous late summer day in September nearly 60 women gathered at the DHS Center in Putnam to honor and remember the memory of the man/priest who was instrumental in the foundation of the Congregation of the Daughters of the Holy Spirit in 1706.

Dom Jean Leuduger was a native of Brittany, France. After his ordination to the priesthood at age 25, he dedicated himself to working with the people of the upper regions of Brittany as parish priest and home missionary. He was a man of deep prayer with a special devotion to the Holy Spirit and to Mary. He worked hand in hand with the foundresses of the Congregation and remained near the Sisters as guide and counselor from 1706 through 1714. He shared his dedication to the poor and to the education of children with his beloved Sisters. He dreamed of one day crossing the ocean and bringing his profound love of God to many on the other side.

Leuduger died on January 17, 1722, leaving the rich legacy of his Daughters to the world.

The gathering on September 10th featured a meet and greet among the members of the three Branches of the Congregation and a good number of former DHS. The participants shared a time of prayer and there was even a quiz on the life of Dom Jean and the history of the Congregation. Of course, an indoor cookout with a multitude of home-made desserts, offered a delightful and delicious lunch for one and all.

Excited voices rose in pitch, cameras rolled and captured shots that



would freeze this moment in time. The afternoon fled much too quickly and gradually hugs (Covid not allowed on the premises that day), made parting ways bittersweet as promises of prayer and of staying in touch echoed from the assembly room out into the parking lot as the day came to a close.

Gratitude to the Provincial Team for imagining and planning this event and sincere thanks as well to all who came together in one heart and one Spirit. In the words of our closing prayer "Let us pray that we remain open to the challenging calls of the present time, attentive to this world, to the Church, and faithful to the origins of our Congregation". Happy Anniversary, Dom Jean, and to each of us as well.

JAN PATECHINO BOYLE, DHS CONSECRATED SECULAR

11/11/1938 – 10/28/2022

On Friday, October 28, 2022, DHS Consecrated Secular BLANCHE JAN PATECHINO BOYLE breathed her last on earth and entered life eternal a few days short of her 84th birthday.

Jan, as she preferred to be called, was born in Collinsville, CT. She was the third of seven girls

in the family. Jan was proud of her hardworking mother who provided the girls with a stable life until their home burned down. This tragedy forced their mom to scatter the children with some going to the county home, one with an aunt and the two babies went into foster care. Jan said she never realized they were financially poor until she reached high school. In spite of that she knew she wanted a good education. Jan claimed she had been personally called by the Spirit to study mathematics. And so she did, along with mechanical engineering. She loved sharing her knowledge and expertise with students of all ages since she believed she was responding directly to her God's call.

Not long after learning about the Secular Branch of the Daughters of the Holy Spirit, Jan joined the group and pronounced her first vows on June 5th 2010.

Jan was indeed a gifted woman who shared her talents in every way possible whenever and wherever she could. She was likeable and radiated the warmth of her God's love through joy and suffering. Jan admitted she maintained her strong faith and that it held her up through thick and through thin. Jan was laid to rest in the family plot in Windsor, Ct.

Jan, you were many things to many people. Intercede for us now as we strive to continue your legacy. The world is a much better place for your having been by our side.



ANITA PAUL, DHS (Sr. JEANNE BENIGNA)

12/31/1930 – 11/23/2022

In the wee hours of November 23rd, Sister Anita Paul placed her soul in the awaiting hands of her Lord for the last time.

Anita was 92 years of age and entered the world on December 31st, 1930 in Washington, Vermont. She was one of seven children born to Felix and Antoinette Paul.

At 19 years of age she entered the Congregation of the Daughters of the Holy Spirit and pronounced her first vows at the Motherhouse of the DHS in Brittany, France in 1950.

After her initial formation, Sister returned to the USA and attended Diocesan Sisters' College on the campus of the former Annhurst College where she earned her BA degree in education. Anita would continue her studies at St. Michael's College in Winooski, VT and came away with an MA in religious education.

Sr. Jeanne spent several years in the elementary classroom in Catholic Parochial schools in Chicopee and Fitchburg, MA. In 1967 she was named Directress of Novices in St. Hubert, Canada where she remained until 1973. At that time she returned to the USA and ministered as principal in Tupper Lake, NY and Waterbury CT. These administrative posts served as a springboard for Sister's work with migrants in Maryland and Virginia whom she served for 13 years.

Sr Anita's gifts as administrator were equally recognized by Province leadership and she was appointed to serve as Provincial Councillor, Directress of Ongoing Education Programs for the US Province, and Coordinator of the Provincial House Community and of the DHS Health Care Center in Putnam. It was from here that Anita moved to the Retirement Home, The Card Home, in Willimantic, CT. Last spring Sister opted to transfer to St. Joseph Living Center in Windham where she joined the already established DHS Community.

Sr Anita is interred at St. Mary Cemetery in Putnam, CT in the section reserved for the DHS.

We remember you fondly, Sr, Anita, and sing God's praises for the gift you were to all of us.



**CLÉMENCE THÉRÈSE CROTEAU, DHS
(SR. MARIE CLÉMENT)**

8/3/1927 – 2/1/2023

On August 3rd, 1927 the world was blessed with a baby girl to be named Clémence Thérèse, the 16th of 17 children born to Clément and Malvina (LeClerc) Croteau.

Clémence was raised in Fitchburg, MA and attended local Catholic Schools. As a young

child she developed a strong devotion to Mary, our intercessor with the Holy Trinity. She maintained this devotion throughout her life and among her last words was a Hail Mary in her beloved French language.

She entered the Congregation of the Daughters of the Holy Spirit in 1945 and professed her first vows in 1949. Soon thereafter the young religious traveled to Chicopee, MA where she served the parish as sacristan. The following year Clémence began a long career as dietician and worked in communities and schools in Wauregan, Bridgeport and Uncasville, CT. She also served at Annhurst College in Woodstock, CT, traveled to Burlington, VT and then back to the Provincial House in Putnam, CT. Twenty six years later Clémence decided it was time for a career change so she accepted a position as a Nursing Assistant at Fairview Nursing Home in Leominster, MA. She remained in that field until 1993 when she obtained her certificate as CNA. At that time she moved into private practice and served those in need in their own homes. Six years later Sister retired and moved back to the Provincial House in 2000 where she accepted to transport Sisters in residence to doctor and other appointments as well as to varied outings and activities. One of her favorite activities was to ride the float at Christmas time in Putnam's well-known and well attended Dazzle Light Parade. She loved to sing and this was a super opportunity to offer her lovely voice to assure that the real reason for the season was remembered by all.

Sister Clémence joined the DHS Community at St Joseph Living Center in 2018. While there she participated in as many activities as possible especially bingo and bowling. She was an avid knitter and loved to knit toques for friends, family and to share with those in need. She took great pride in showing her little masterpieces to one and all who were interested. She also enjoyed to paint using the latest versions of books available. Her choice of bright colors was a reflection of the light within our gifted sister. Clémence liked to celebrate life and special occasions and enjoyed outings to restaurants and treats of pizza, fudge, ice cream and Canadian peppermints that she eagerly shared with everyone who came to visit and with all her sisters in community. Sister had a unique gift for cake decorating and it was obvious that she carefully perused all birthday or special occasion cakes that came her way carefully pointing out all the hard work and time such a production involved.

Clémence was known for her big heart, and in the end, her Lord called her home via that very large heart. She entered eternal life peacefully and readily very early on the morning of February 1st.
